GONGRESS ASSEMBLED.

THEN in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal flation to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent refpect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should

declare the caufes which impel them to the feparation. We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among thefe are Life, Liberty and the Purfuit of Happine's.—That to fecure thefe Rights, Governments are inflituted among men, deriving their just powers from the confent of the Governed, that whenever any form of Government be-comes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on fuch principles, and organizing its powers in fuch form, as to them shall feem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Pru-dence, indeed will dictate that Governments long esla-blished should not be changed for light and transient causes, and accordingly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are suf-ferable, than to righe trienselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off fuch Government, and to provide new guards for their future fecurity. Such has been the patient fufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former system of Government. The history of the present King of Great-Britain, is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the ellablishment of an absolute Tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world.

Stone, circa 1833.

INTRODUCTION

It is a truism that Lower Manhattan has been America's town square since its founding in 1524, even though its history is much deeper. Virtually every aspect of global, local and national significance can be in some manner traced to this Downtown stage. Some have been forgotten and some have been transformative in our culture and many have fallen between. This is both a project in urban archeology and a way of describing the city over time. It Happened Here captures the multiple and overlapping stories that are woven throughout our city's life. It embraces America's history as the museums, monuments and memorials that dot its streetscape do. It highlights many of the concerns, events and places that the people who lived, fought, worked and visited here thought were important at their moment in time.

It takes another look at the issues that they were preoccupied with and how they solved them: their politics, religion, social protest, health and safety, commerce, disasters and defense, scandals and crime, education, publications, art and culture, parades and celebrations, architecture and engineering. It encapsulates the events that shaped the physical and cultural landscape within the changing geography at the water's edge. And it raises questions that need to be considered as we plan a more resilient city in our future.

It Happened Here seeks to excavate its many historical layers: from its inception as the precolonial Lenapehoking territory (once inhabited by the Munsee Lenape and Wappinger tribes), to the creation of New Amsterdam by the Dutch, to the establishment of the first free African settlement in North America, to the establishment of British control, to the gateway for immigration, to being the site of the American Revolution, to its present-day significance as the nation's cultural and financial nerve-center.

To kick off the United States' upcoming 250th birthday It Happened Here will be a weekend on July 4, 2025 which will compress our 400 years into 4 days with each day being devoted to a century. The program will feature multiple types of activations, including tours, panels, and special events that will take place in many of the sites downtown where highlighted historical events occurred supplemented with our digital museum without walls app.

July 4th 2023 is the first of the many prequels where we will share some of the significant events in a series of special programs in the places where they took place.

Her most recent book is Cocktails & Conversations: Dialogues on Architectural Design, published in 2018. She received her undergraduate degree from the University of Pennsylvania and her Masters in Architecture from the Harvard Graduate School of Design.



Seth Kaller is a leading agent, dealer, and collection builder specializing in important American historic documents. Within a year of entering the field in 1988, Seth started acquiring documents for Lewis Lehrman and Richard Gilder, forming the basis of the Gilder Lehrman Collection on deposit at the New-York Historical Society, now recognized as one of the most important American history collections ever privately assembled. Seth's other clients include the National Constitution Center, multiple Smithsonian Museums, the Library of Congress, other museums, libraries and private collectors.

Treasures Seth has acquired for clients include John Hancock's letters announcing independence and the majority of rare copies of the Declaration of Independence that have appeared on the market in the last half-century, a Benjamin Franklin signed copy and working drafts of the U.S. Constitution, George Washington and Thomas Jefferson letters on religion, the press, and government, Abraham Lincoln signed copies of the Emancipation Proclamation and 13th Amendment, Robert E. Lee's farewell to his troops, Albert Einstein's first scientific paper, Clement C. Moore's autograph manuscript of *The Night Before Christmas*, and key documents on women's suffrage and civil rights, plus historic maps, prints, photographs, sculpture and paintings.



Melinda H. Allison's interest in American genealogy began as a child when her grandmother showed her newspaper obituary clippings from early Missouri settler ancestors. After years of researching her family tree, she used her findings to join the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) in 2020 and the National Society of Colonial Dames in New York (NSCDNY) in 2022. So far, she has identified 44 Revolutionary War patriot ancestors, including 29 who served in the Militia or Continental Line.

Her genealogical training includes all DAR Genealogy Education Program courses, the Midwest African American Genealogy Institute (MAAGI) Methods and Strategies three-day course, and two days of African American lineage research training at the Sons and Daughters of the United States Middle Passage (SDUSMP) Annual Conferences in 2021 and 2023. Originally from the Washington, DC area, she has worked as a bid/proposal manager in the federal defense contracting industry for the past 15 years. She received an MBA with a concentration in Marketing from the University of Scranton and a BS in Economics from George Mason University.



Ted Knudsen is the Co-Founder of the NYC Revolutionary Trail at the Gotham Center for New York City History. After a 15-year career on Wall Street, Ted is completing his PHD in American History at the CUNY Graduate Center, teaching undergrads at Queens College and working with the Gotham Center.
