CONSTITUTION PREAMBLE: WHEREAS, it has become evident from the decline of proper celebration of such National holidays as the Fourth of July, Washington's Birthday, and the like, that popular interest in the events and men of the War of the Revolution is less than in the earlier days of the Republic;

AND WHEREAS, this lack of interest is to be attributed not so much to lapse of time as to the neglect on the part of descendants of Revolutionary heroes to perform their duty of keeping before the public mind the memory of the services of their ancestors, and of the times in which they lived, and of the principles for which they contended;

THEREFORE, the Society of the "SONS OF THE REVOLUTION IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK" has been instituted to perpetuate the memory of the men who, in military, naval or civil service, by their acts or counsel, achieved American Independence; to promote and assist in the proper celebration of the anniversaries of Washington's Birthday, the Battles of Lexington and Bunker Hill, the Fourth of July, the Capitulations of Saratoga and Yorktown, the Evacuation of New York by the British Army, and other prominent events relating to or connected with the War of the Revolution; to collect and secure for preservation the manuscript rolls, records and other documents relating to that War; to inspire among the members and their descendants the patriotic spirit of their forefathers; to inculcate in the community in general, sentiments of Nationality and respect for the principles for which the patriots of the Revolution contended; to assist in the commemorative celebration of other great historical events of National importance, and to promote social intercourse and the feeling of fellowship among its members.

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George Washington Birthday Ball Over the Years

The George Washington Birthday Ball is an annual tradition of Sons of the RevolutionSM in the State of New York, Inc. to commemorate the birth of Washington in Pope Creek, Virginia, on February 22, 1732.

Already a holiday in many states, Washington's Birthday was made a Federal holiday in 1879 by a law signed by President Rutherford B. Hayes. The Uniform Monday Holiday Act of 1968 prescribed that Washington's Birthday be observed on the third Monday of February, creating a three-day weekend.

SRNY established its first annual George Washington Birthday Ball to honor the birth of Washington in 1877 to help fulfill the Society's mission to commemorate Revolutionary heroes and the principles for which they contended.

At the Ball there are many ceremonies which recall the honored patriot and Commander-in-Chief George Washington: the Ceremony of the Cocked Hat, the Distinguished Patriot Award, and the Presentation of the Flags.

By the 1980s, the George Washington Birthday Ball took on the additional role of the annual fundraiser to benefit Fraunces Tavern Museum. The contributions raise funds to underwrite the operating costs of the Museum, which include new exhibitions, programs, and object conservation.







Distinguished Patriot

In recognition of the 20th Anniversary of the attacks on the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001, this year's Distinguished Patriot is the Honorable George E. Pataki, Governor of New York from 1995 to 2006, who served as Governor at the time of the 9/11 terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center and who led New York State's recovery efforts in the aftermath of the attacks. None of us will forget the horror of the 9/11 attacks, which killed almost 3,000 people, including over 400 first responders. Many New Yorkers lost family or friends in the attacks. In addition to the tragic loss of life, the downtown Manhattan community, of which our Society and its Fraunces Tavern Museum are a part, suffered in other ways as well. Fortunately, the recovery efforts set in motion since the attacks have, in the ensuing years, resulted in the revival of our downtown community.



Gov. George E. Pataki is Senior Counsel at Norton Rose Fulbright LLP, where he focuses on environmental, energy and infrastructure law. He also is founder and Chairman of the Pataki-Cahill Group, a

consulting firm that mainly advises on climate change, energy and the environment.

He served as governor of New York for three terms from 1995-2006, winning election in 1994 and reelection in 1998 and 2002.

Gov. Pataki's service as governor was defined by his strong stewardship in the aftermath of the 9-11 terrorist attacks. Working with President George W. Bush, New York City Mayor Rudy Giuliani and other officials, Gov. Pataki provided steady, reassuring leadership and helped guide the city and state as it recovered from the tragic loss of lives, physical devastation and psychic wounds.

He accompanied President Bush on his first visit to the World Trade Center site and on his meeting with first responders. In the weeks and months after the

attacks, Gov. Pataki honored the fallen at scores of funerals and has attended, and continues to attend, numerous events and occasions marking the tragic period. Gov. Pataki played an instrumental role in the redevelopment of the World Trade Center site – he was responsible for appointing a majority of the Port Authority commissioners and half of the Lower Manhattan Development Corp. members who helped determine the site's future. Through his determined leadership, he ensured that the redeveloped World Trade Center site was a global example of greenbuilding design. A symbolic cornerstone with Gov. Pataki's name was laid at the 104-story One World Trade Center, also known as the Freedom Tower, on July 4, 2004.

As New York State's chief executive, Gov. Pataki balanced his pro-business philosophy with awardwinning, cutting-edge policies in the renewable energy and environmental fields. He is widely known for his protection of over one million acres of open space, the most since Teddy Roosevelt. He helped reduce greenhouse gas emissions by spearheading the establishment of the first mandatory cap and trade carbon initiative. This Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative now includes 10 Northeastern and Midatlantic states.

In another environmentally-friendly policy, he implemented the first integrated strategy for creating clean, renewable transportation networks utilizing alternative fuels. This integrated strategy included tax and other incentives for consumers and manufacturers, grants for alternative retail fuel distribution systems and the exemption of renewable fuels from all state and local taxes.

As governor, he worked to create public-private partnerships for clean energy generation in New York State, resulting in one of the largest industrial solar power arrays in the US, two cellulosic ethanol pilot production facilities and one of the largest wind power farms in the Eastern United States.

Gov. Pataki's pro-environmental, but business-friendly efforts have won him plaudits from the media and environmental groups. Business Week named Gov. Pataki one of the top 20 people working to cut gases that cause global warming. In its inaugural "green issue" in 2006, Vanity Fair characterized him as a governor who "gets it" on environmental issues. Gov. Pataki was born in Peekskill, N.Y., an hour north of New York City, and grew up on the family farm there. His father was a Hungarian immigrant and his mother a mix of Italian and Irish stock.

He graduated from Peekskill High School and attended Yale University on an academic scholarship, earning a B.A. At Yale, he served as Chairman of the Conservative Party of the Yale Political Union. During political union debates, he squared off with John Kerry, who represented the liberal side. He received his J.D. at Columbia Law School, serving as Editor of the Columbia Law Review.

He always has held a deep belief in the importance of public service. In 1981, he was elected mayor of Peekskill. He then moved on to the New York legislature, serving as a state assemblyman from 1985-1993 and as a state senator in 1994. He also practiced law at two well-known New York law firms before serving as governor.

Gov. Pataki and his wife, Libby, live in Garrison, N.Y. They have four children and seven grandchildren.

Challenging Times

Challenging times are not new to Fraunces Tavern. In the Revolutionary era, Fraunces Tavern survived a 1775 British naval bombardment which sent a cannon ball through the roof, the British attack on New York in the summer of 1776, and the 1776 great fire in British-occupied New York City. In the early 1900s, Fraunces Tavern survived the wrecking ball, thanks to its acquisition and restoration by our Society. In 1975, Fraunces Tavern was the site of a bombing by the FALN separatist group. And, in recent years, it bore witness to the 9/11 attacks and experienced significant flooding during Superstorm Sandy.

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A Message from the President of the Sons of the Revolution[™] in the State of New York, Inc.

Dear Friends and Supporters,

Welcome to our Society's 145th George Washington Birthday Ball, in honor of George Washington and to benefit our Fraunces Tavern® Museum. It is a true joy to see so many friends in person tonight, and I am most grateful for your presence and support.

Fraunces Tavern – now 303 years old – is at the core of the complex of five historic buildings which house Fraunces Tavern Museum, which our Society has operated since it acquired and restored Fraunces Tavern in the early 1900s. Fraunces Tavern is a unique site which our Society uses to tell the story of the American Revolution to school children and adults alike. We do this through engaging exhibits, a robust series of programs focused on the Revolutionary War era, and the commemoration of historical events, including those which occurred at Fraunces Tavern.

Since 2020, the COVID pandemic has had a devastating impact on our world, with heartbreaking numbers of lives lost. Families, businesses, and institutions, including ours, suffered significant economic damage from which recovery is continuing. Throughout, our Society continued to carry out its mission. Our talented staff adapted and employed technology which has enabled us to expand our educational outreach to audiences throughout the Nation.

Thankfully, our Museum is now open. Please come to visit. Many in-person events and programs have also resumed. In September 2021, we gathered for an engaging presentation by author and SRNY member Ric Murphy, who spoke about his multiple ancestors who fought in the Revolution. At our well-attended Evacuation Day Dinner, we reenacted the same 13 toasts given on November 25, 1783, at a celebratory banquet held at Fraunces Tavern to honor General George Washington's triumphant return to New York City at the end of the Revolutionary War. In December, we presented our annual reenactment of General Washington's emotional farewell to his officers, which took place December 4, 1783, in our Museum's Long Room.

The fall of 2021 also marked the 20th anniversary of the September 11th terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center. In recognition of that solemn anniversary, we will present this year's Distinguished Patriot Award to former Governor George Pataki, who led New York State at that horrific time, and in the years of recovery that followed.

In the upcoming months, we will open a new permanent exhibit which tells the story of the new Republic's departments of War and Foreign Affairs (State) and the Board of Treasury, which leased Fraunces Tavern for use as offices in the 1785 to 1788 time frame. In addition, we will proceed with several significant - and essential - restoration projects which were deferred when COVID struck in 2020.

Your faithful support of this evening enables our work to continue, and your presence encourages us. Thank you so much for your generosity and good will. I hope you have a wonderful evening.

A Message from the Director of Sons of the Revolution[™] in the State of New York, Inc. and its Fraunces Tavern Museum

In 2021, we saw the beginning of a recovery at the Museum and in New York City overall. The widespread availability of coronavirus vaccines, lifting of indoor capacity restrictions, and the gradual return of people to Lower Manhattan permitted us to replace some of the steely resolve which carried us through the previous year with cautious optimism. But progress was often followed by setbacks as new variants of the virus, as well as record-breaking summer storms, deposited fresh questions onto our doorstep and inches of water into our basement. But as we moved into the holiday season, freer to visit the people and places that bring us joy, the belief that we turned a corner was hard to shake. We hope that by the end of 2022, we will seamlessly combine the advances in hybrid learning and communication with the return of our traditional programs, to enhance and grow our operations and better serve our community.

We continued to deliver on our mission with dynamic content, programming, exhibitions, and events that engaged our community online and in person. We hosted authors and historians and collaborated with peers such as the Morris-Jumel Mansion in Upper Manhattan and Keeler Tavern Museum in Ridgefield, CT, to impart Revolutionary and Colonial Era knowledge to attendees. We celebrated the 50th anniversary of the reinterpretation of the Museum's Long Room as an educational period room with a full week of interactive experiences. These included a digital archive on our website and a virtual lecture with Kym S. Rice, a former guest curator of the Museum, as well as a new brochure, children's activity, and an upgrade of the Long Room's reader rail labels. We opened new exhibitions in our Davis Educational Center and Loeb Gallery focusing on the history and iconography behind regimental flags held in the SRNY Color Guard's collection, which tell the stories of the diverse groups who fought for American Independence. And while we continued to patiently await the return of our elementary school students to our in-person School Programs, we developed more online/virtual versions of our traditional tours, programs, and lessons. Both educators and caregivers can use these from their classrooms and their living rooms to educate on topics such as George Washington in New York City as well as the contributions of Black and Women Patriots. Finally, we were able to bring back our docents offering traditional Museum tours, hire reenactors providing new walking tours, and resume our favorite events such as Summer Tavern Night and our Evacuation Day Dinner, as well as the Museum's Washington's Farewell Reenactment. Bringing people together in the present to commemorate and educate about the past is what we do best, and we look forward to doing more of that in the coming year.

In 2022, we have ambitious plans, including the establishment of a new permanent exhibition: a recreation of the offices of the Departments of War and Foreign Affairs (State) and the Board of Treasury–which helped shape the new republic from their early home at Fraunces Tavern. We also plan to resume our façade restoration project to repair and

fortify the most vulnerable and damaged structural elements and thereby safeguard the structural integrity of multiple buildings in our historic complex. Thanks to your generosity, these initiatives can finally be realized.

George Washington & Fraunces Tavern

George Washington's first recorded visit to Fraunces Tavern was on April 13, 1776, when the Continental Army first occupied New York City. During that summer, Washington frequented the Tavern and began to cultivate a close relationship with its proprietor, Samuel Fraunces. After suffering one of the worst defeats of the War at the Battle of Long Island, Washington retreated from New York City and it was seized by the British for the duration of the war. On November 25, 1783, two years after the American victory at Yorktown, the British left New York Citythe last British held city in the thirteen colonies. This day would eventually become known as Evacuation Day. Finally, after seven long years, Washington made a triumphant return to the city, greeted with great jubilation as he made his way down Broadway. Later that same day, Washington attended a dinner at Fraunces Tavern hosted by New York's first American governor, George Clinton.

The following week, on December 4, 1783, General Washington gathered in the historic Long Room of Fraunces Tavern with forty of his officers to attend one last New York celebration in his honor as Commander in Chief. There, Washington gave an emotional farewell to the men who had stood by his side through eight years of fighting. In the post-Revolutionary years, the relationship between Fraunces and Washington continued and Washington brought Fraunces on as his chief steward at the first presidential mansion in New York City.

Since the institution of Sons of the Revolution in the State of New York in 1876 and the opening of its Fraunces Tavern Museum in 1907, SRNY has honored George Washington through a variety of events, exhibitions, and programming. Each November, SRNY holds an annual Evacuation Day Dinner at Fraunces Tavern, keeping the memory of that important event alive by ceremoniously reenacting the thirteen original toasts given in 1783 at that dinner. Additionally, the annual Washington's Farewell event is one of the Museum's most well-attended programs, and features a reenactment of the farewell by a George Washington reenactor. Most recently, General Washington was portrayed by one of the preeminent Washington historians in the country, Daniel Shippey, who also served as an on-set historian for the AMC television series *TURN: Washington's Spies.*

In 1984, Elizabeth and Stanley DeForest Scott graciously donated to the museum a collection of 18th century prints and engravings of George Washington which demonstrate the rich diversity of his likeness. In 2005, the George Washington Portrait Gallery Honoring Elizabeth and Stanley DeForest Scott was dedicated and the Scotts' donated objects were put on permanent display in an exhibition titled A Stoic Countenance: Portraits of George Washington.

For over 100 years, SRNY and its Fraunces Tavern Museum have helped to keep revolutionary history alive in New York City. For years to come, the public can visit 54 Pearl Street and experience for themselves the legacy of George Washington at Fraunces Tavern.

About Fraunces Tavern

Built around 1719, the building that would become Fraunces Tavern was an elegant residence for merchant Stephen Delancey. In 1762, Samuel Fraunces bought the building and transformed it into one of the most popular meeting places in a city which was a political hotbed of thought and action.

Once the Revolutionary War broke out and the Continental Army lost control of the City, Loyalist forces occupied the area until the War ended in 1783. During the British occupation, the Tavern was run by Sam's Loyalist son-in-law, Charles Campbell, irregularly providing food, drink, and community throughout the War. After the War, the Tavern soon resumed normal operations.

While negotiations for the British evacuation of New York were underway, the American Commissioners set up headquarters at the Tavern. On December 4, 1783, nine days after the British evacuation, George Washington delivered his emotional farewell to his officers in the second floor Long Room.


Between 1785 and 1788, working under the Articles of Confederation, the Congress leased rooms at 54 Pearl Street for three government departments: War, Foreign Affairs, and Treasury. In the 1800s, the building served several purposes, underwent many structural changes, and suffered from a series of fires. Sons of the Revolution in the State of New York took ownership in 1904 and completed a restoration to open Fraunces Tavern Museum & Restaurant in 1907. The building was designated a New York City landmark in 1965, the block was designated as a Historic District on the National Register of Historic Places in 1977, and the building was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2008.

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Fraunces Tavern Museum Book Award


Since 1972, the Fraunces Tavern Museum Book Award has been presented annually to the author of the best newly published work on the American Revolution, combining original scholarship, insight, and good writing. This award is one way the Museum fulfills its mission to educate the public about the Revolution and acknowledge the historical community dedicated to the study and public education regarding the American fight for freedom.

2021 Fraunces Tavern Museum Book Award Recipient

Mary Beth Norton, 1774: The Long Year of the Revolution

Norton is the author of five books and coeditor of several others. Her textbook, A People and a Nation, a survey of U.S. history written with five other authors, has been published in ten editions and has sold more than 500,000 copies. Norton is the Mary Donlon Alger Professor Emerita of American History at Cornell University. She lives in Ithaca, New York.

From one of our most acclaimed and original colonial historians, a groundbreaking book—the first to look at the critical "long year" of 1774 and the revolutionary change that took place from December 1773 to mid-April 1775, from the Boston Tea Party and the First Continental Congress to the Battles of Lexington and Concord. Drawing extensively on pamphlets, newspapers, and personal correspondence, Norton reconstructs colonial political discourse as it happened, showing the vigorous campaign mounted by conservatives criticizing congressional actions. But by then it was too late. In early 1775, governors throughout the colonies informed colonial officials in London that they were unable to thwart the increasing power of the committees and their allied provincial congresses. Although Declaration of Independence would not be formally adopted until July 1776, Americans, even before the outbreak of war in April 1775, had in effect "declared independence" by obeying the decrees of their new provincial governments rather than colonial officials.

George Washington's numerous accolades and virtues moved many artists to create reverent portraits during his lifetime. This permanent exhibition offers a rare glimpse into the popular attitudes and perspectives on Washington's life and legacy through a selection of late eighteenth-century artworks.

The Long Room

This period room is the famous site of George Washington's farewell to his officers on December 4, 1783. It recreates an Early American urban tavern public room through authentic colonial artifacts and audio interactives.

A Monument to Memory: 300 Years of Living History

This special exhibition explores the many roles 54 Pearl Street has played in the public life of Lower Manhattan, inviting visitors to discover how the stories we tell through historic preservation and inquiry shape our memories of the past.

To the Beat of Their Own Drums: American Regimental Flags of the Revolutionary War

Flags have long served as visual representations of human groups, expressing a collective experience and forming communities around a set of shared values and ideals. Before uniting around the Stars and Stripes, regimental battle flags bore special importance to their members. In this permanent exhibition, learn about the history and iconography behind the regimental flags of the diverse groups who fought for American independence.

Departments of War, Foreign Affairs, and Treasury Offices Honoring Stanley and Elizabeth Scott

Opening in 2022

Between 1785 and 1788, between the end of the Revolutionary War and the year after the signing of the United States Constitution, working under the Articles of Confederation, the Congress rented rooms at 54 Pearl Street for three government departments. During this time, Washington's compatriots in the Revolution, Henry Knox and John Jay, headed the Departments of War and Foreign Affairs, with offices on the first and second floors, respectively. Arthur Lee, Walter Livingston, and Samuel Osgood ran the Board of Treasury, with offices on the third floor. These political leaders and the military, diplomatic and financial challenges they undertook during this period, meaningfully shaped the early Republic. Made possible through major support from Stanley and Elizabeth Scott, this new permanent, immersive visitor experience brings this pivotal time in the formation of the United States to life.

Object feature

Chinese Export Porcelain Platter with reticulated border

The Empress of China, the first American ship to sail to China from the newly independent United States, returned to New York harbor carrying a cargo of objects a month after the Department of Foreign Affairs had moved into Fraunces Tavern. Aboard that ship was Samuel Shaw, who would later be appointed the first American consul to China, and then be reappointed by President Washington. He communicated with Secretary Jay about his travels and was then employed by Secretary Knox, to whom Shaw had served as an aide-de-camp during the Revolutionary War.

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


